- 1. Ongoing, long-term charity partnerships. These are with organisations that we've committed to supporting within our NMC quality submissions to Transport Scotland.
- 2. Annual national charity partner. We ask the workforce to vote on a charity of the year that we commit to support. The idea is that it not only ensures a key focus is delivered for a specific cause but the involvement of the staff in identifying it should ensure some dedicated support and engagement in fundraising efforts.
- **3. Regional/local charity programme**. Employees are asked to nominate a smaller local cause which we will donate £1,000 to. The idea is that these will be more local initiatives that will appreciate the financial boost. It might be an organisation that is close to the heart of the person who nominated it.
- 4. Supporting employee fundraising challenges. We are keen to support the efforts of team members who take on fundraising personal challenges by giving them a significant donation.
- 5. Support for communities and initiatives. As well as traditional charities we consider applications to support local clubs and organisations such as youth sports groups and community groups. We also undertake a lot of STEM engagement with schools.

£19K + RAISED

We' committed to raising at least £10,000 per year for Cash For Kids.

In 2023, that target has been smashed, with a total of **£19,195** being donated as a result of two activities – the staff raffle in January and the <u>Corporate Charity Golf Day</u> in August.

£1,195 was raised in the staff charity raffle. £18,000 was raised at the Corporate Charity Golf Day.





£1,790 RAISED

Thirteen BEAR employees signed up to Doddie Aid, the sixweek participation event at the start of the year. They ran, walked, cycled and hopped their way to a total of 2,785 miles between them and raised \pounds 900, which BEAR match funded making a total of \pounds 1,790 for the charity.





£1,883 RAISED

The 11th BEAR Scotland five-a-side charity football tournament took place in April 2023.

£1,883 was raised for SAMH. £941.50 came from team entry fees and the remainder was match funded by BEAR Scotland.





Supporting Veterans

BEAR is a member of the RBLI Tommy Club which supports veterans. We also work in partnership with Armed Forces Recovery Centres and the Careers Transition Partnership to encourage new recruits from the forces.

We are continuing to work with Scotland's Bravest Manufacturing Company as the preferred sign supplier.

Additionally, £500 was donated to the Scotland and Northern Ireland Personnel Recovery Centre to help fund travel expenses for its cross Atlantic trip to Washington DC where they met with the United States Marine Corps and Allied Forces Federation.





2. ANNUAL NATIONAL CHARITY PARTNER

We undertake a vote where all staff are given the chance to vote for the National Charity Partner of the Year. The idea is that the shortlist contains organisations that are Scotland-wide and complement the existing long-term partnerships.

STEPPING UP SUPPORT ACROSS THE BUSINESS

In May we linked Alzheimer Scotland fundraising to Eurovia's Steps to Health Challenge. Fourteen teams managed to raise a total of \pounds 229.

Tartan Bridge Films and AA Media Corporation Limited Both made a generous donation of £1,500 to our charity of the year, Alzheimer Scotland, in return for being permitted to film at the Forth Road Bridge.

We also supported the Forget Me Not Appeal by volunteering to raise awareness of Dementia, signpost to Alzheimer Scotland and raise much needed funds to continue their vital work. The event took place in Morrisons stores across Scotland. All staff were invited to a virtual 'Dementia Friends' session to learn more about the disease and how to support those suffering from it.

FORTH HEDGEHOG HOSPITAL RECEIVES £1,000 DONATION FROM BEAR SCOTLAND



Rosyth-based Forth Hedgehog Hospital, has received a £1,000 donation from trunk road maintenance company BEAR Scotland, which looks after the Forth Road Bridge and Queensferry Crossing.

Forth Hedgehog Hospital, which has been caring for sick and injured hedgehogs from across Scotland for the last nine years, is the first local cause to receive a financial boost in 2023 as part of all BEAR's local and regional charity commitment which sees staff nominate causes that are important to them.

BEAR Scotland manages and maintains trunk roads in the South East of Scotland on behalf of Transport Scotland. Their Media and Communications Officer, Chris Waite, nominated Fresh Start Borders as part of the local charity initiative, which focuses on supporting local causes within the communities where BEAR Scotland operates. All staff are given the opportunity to nominate local charities which are important to them. It is the fourth charity to benefit from the initiative this year.

CAITHNESS KLICS GETS £1K BOOST FROM BEAR SCOTLAND

Caithness KLICS was set up ten years ago and supports young carers between 5 and 18 years old who are caring for a person who has any kind of illness, disability or addiction within their family or community. Young carers tend to have extra responsibilities, like doing chores, looking after young children, and handling medication. This means young carers can miss out on school and social lives. Caithness KLICS gives these young carers a place to have fun and be children again without having to worry about anything else. This donation is part of BEAR Scotland's local charity initiative that seeks nominations from staff for worthy regional causes to receive support. Caithness KLICS was nominated by North West Engagement Manager, Kim Thain, because it means a lot to her family.

TAYSIDE CANCER CHARITY GETS £1K BOOST FROM BEAR SCOTLAND



BEAR Scotland, the road maintenance company which looks after the A92 between Dundee and Arbroath, has donated £1k to Tayside Cancer Support. Tayside Cancer Support, which is run out of St Aidans Centre, Broughty Ferry, offers support services for people in Tayside who have been affected by cancer including patients, family and friends, alongside support groups that offer friendship and reassurance through group activities including talks, demonstrations and different relax therapies. Founded in 2013 by Arlene and Derek Kennedy of Renfrewshire, Brightest Star emerged from a deeply personal tragedy: the sudden loss of their five-year-old son, Jack. While the medical professionals provided invaluable support during their difficult time, the Kennedys discovered a lack of ongoing assistance for bereaved families. Motivated by their own experience, they took it upon themselves to create a support network for those enduring a similar experience.

Brightest Star was nominated to benefit from a financial boost from BEAR Scotland by M80 DBFO Asset Manager, Laura Gray, as part of the company's ongoing commitment to supporting local charities. Laura used to know Jack's grandmother and recognises the impact the charity has on families.

A noticeable increase in litter on the A1 trunk road between the English border and Edinburgh prompted BEAR Scotland staff to team up with East Lothian Councill, Scottish Borders Council and City of Edinbugh Councils for a dedicated focus on litterpicking in the last week of June 2023.



In June the Major Bridges team at Queensferry hosted a visit for winners of charity raffles and auctions who had won a trip to the top of the road bridges. The group were taken for a once in a lifetime trip to the top of the Queensferry Crossing, 210 metres above the Forth.

In September, our teams provided traffic management support and signage for the Scottish Horse Endurance Championships which took place in the Borders.



BEAR provided nine litter pickers, 15 vests and 15 pairs of gloves to a group of locals undertaking an A83 shore clean. We also collected the 40 bags of refused they'd collected and disposed of it at the end of the day.



The SE Electrical Team helped to prepare for the annual Ferry Fair by putting up bunting in Queensferry. They also put bunting up for Kirkliston Gala committee and in Dalgety Bay.



5. EDUCATION & STEM ACTIVITY

BEAR Scotland runs an extensive STEM face to face and virtual education programme



BEAR Scotland relaunched the extended STEM Education Programme that runs out of the Forth Bridges Customer and Education Centre in Queensferry. This is a free Transport Scotland education programme with face-to-face visits for P3 to S6 pupils at the Contact and Education Centre in Queensferry and a full programme of STEM engineering online sessions for P5 to S3 pupils.

BEAR Scotland has visits for primary and secondary schools at the Contact and Education Centre in Queensferry to more than **3,870** young people and more than **2,640** have joined us online through the DYW Live programme (Developing the Young Workforce), which is hosted on MS Teams by eSgoil / Education Scotland.

In total we have engaged with more than 7,000 young people from across the Scotland through online and in person visits to the Contact and Education Centre and visits from our STEM ambassadors.

Oban High School's S5 & S6 engineering class enjoyed a visit on 5 October by STEM Ambassadors James Duthie and Hugh Buchanan from our NW Bridges team. The students had the opportunity to discuss BEAR's work and ask questions about what it's really like being an engineer. James and Hugh ran a "Can You Cantilever?" session which saw the pupils design and build a structure from the materials and budget available.
